DISCUSSION

Primary Applications

The Caledon Council Community Golf Tournament (CCCGT) is an annual charity event that raises funds for non-profit organizations either located in Caledon, or providing services in Caledon. For the period 2004 to 2017 the CCCGT has donated a total of \$1,009,020 to community organizations. In 2017, the Living City Foundation/TRCA was selected as the primary recipient and received \$75,000.

As approved by the CCCGT Committee in 2017, the grant application for the primary and secondary recipients for the 2018 golf tournament was made available on the Town's website at the beginning of December, with a due date of January 31, 2018. The criteria indicated on the application form is that the preference is to award the Primary Grant to an applicant supporting community projects within Caledon and that applicants will be considered generally based on, but not limited to, the following criteria: non-profit organization, located in Caledon and/or provide services for Caledon residents; capital project in nature benefitting the community; detailed scope of the project and a plan to recognize the grant and Town. Organizations were made aware of the application through newspaper advertising, social media and email communication.



A list of all applications received for the primary recipient of the 2018 CCCGT is provided below for the CCCGT Committee to review and designate a primary recipient. Once the primary recipient has been designated, the CCCGT Committee will indicate the amount of net funds to be dedicated to the primary recipient. In the past, this has been done based upon the amount indicated on the primary recipient grant application, or a set percentage of net funds raised from the event. In 2017, the amount chosen was \$75,000 of the net proceeds and in 2016, 60% of the net proceeds was allocated as the primary grant.

All applications and supporting documents submitted by organizations are provided in Schedule A.

Once the primary recipient is chosen by the CCCGT committee, Staff will work with the primary grant recipient on a grant agreement outlining items including: overall project timeline, grant specified project timeline, additional fundraising details, schedule of payments, scope of project, expectation of project completion report etc.

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Secondary Applications

The grant application (as approved by the CCCGT committee in 2017) for the remaining funds from the 2017 golf tournament was made available on the website at the beginning of December, with a due date of January 31, 2018. Organizations were made aware of the application through newspaper advertising and email communication. The CCCGT grant review committee met in mid-February to review the applications and make funding recommendations using the criteria outlined in the grant guidelines. The committee considered if projects showcased the Town of Caledon, would benefit the community, if the organization has received other funding from the Town, and if partial funding is awarded could the project or program still proceed. The CCCGT grant review committee is comprised of staff from the Community Services Department (Recreation), Finance and Infrastructure Services Department (Finance), and Strategic Initiatives Department (Partnerships and Events).

Recommendations from the CCCGT grant evaluation committee for disbursement of the remaining 2017 Tournament funds, \$27,625 are provided in Schedule B.

It is preferred that grant recipients complete their project and submit all receipts to the Town by December 1 of the year in which they are awarded the grant. Any organizations that cannot meet the December 1st deadline will need to request an extension from the CCCGT grant evaluation committee. Any portion of the secondary grants that receipts have not been submitted for, the funds are allocated the following year to other qualifying organizations.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

We serve clients and families in our community at any time through the trajectory of living with a lifelimiting illness through bereavement support, spiritual support and at home palliative care. Bethell Hospice palliative care positively impacts an entire family of all ages. We have served residents with a terminal illness as young as 23. The care provided also extend to parents, family members and friends who are experiencing grief. In many cases we have served individuals who are in their 30's, 40's, and 50's who have young children, teenage children and young adult children, all of whom are able to take advantage of the psychosocial, spiritual care as well as one-on-one or group bereavement support Bethell Hospice also supports individuals who prefer to stay at home with In-Home palliative care visiting. There is no means test to determine who can use any of the support services as there is no cost to anyone who needs us.

Day Wellness Program

The program focuses on Integrative Wellness and includes art projects, meditation and mindfulness, cooking and more. Anyone living with a life-limiting illness can join the day program.

Integrative Wellness / Complementary Therapy

Research has shown that Therapeutic Touch[®], Reiki and Reflexology are effective in inducing relaxation, reducing anxiety and changing the perception of pain. Facilitation of the body's natural restorative process brings about an improved sense of wellbeing, providing comfort during distressing circumstances.

Spiritual Care

For some, spirituality is an expression of faith and religion. For others, spirituality is expressed in finding meaning and purpose through body, mind, heart and spirit, by expressions of love for family and friends, art, music, creation, meditation and other mediums. Services are provided by a certified Psycho-Social Spiritual Care Coordinator.

Bereavement Care

Supportive friends and family often require continued support when their loved one dies. Bereavement Support continues the commitment following the death of a loved one. Bethell Hospice provides bereavement therapeutic counselling and support in both one-to-one and group settings with trained and credentialed Counsellors for both adults and children.

In-Home Visiting

Our In-home Visiting Support Program is one of our community care programs provided by speciallytrained volunteers. Visiting volunteers provide a reassuring presence, companionship and comfort for palliative individuals receiving care at home, as well as their caregivers. Volunteers are trained to offer emotional support, caregiver relief, and practical assistance, comfort care, and can even help with legacy work.

The purchase of a new accessible wheelchair passenger bus will benefit hundreds of people in Caledon who cannot access community services or even maintain themselves in Caledon without these vehicles. A new vehicle supports CCS' ability to provide safe, comfortable and timely transportation to seniors and those with disabilities. The bus wrap provides easy identification for clients utilizing the service while also promoting the sharing of important contact information throughout the community for all Caledon residents needing any of CCS' services.
	CCS' Transportation Program has a fleet of 12 vehicles: 9 wheelchair accessible buses, 1 wheelchair accessible van, 1 passenger van and 1 car. Vehicles range in age from 1-11 years.
	CCS has a long history of providing transportation services to Caledon residents. This service began in 1989 as "Med Wheels" and over the years, CCS has invested its own fundraising and various government grants in adapting and expanding its transportation program in response to the growing needs of Caledon residents. CCS continues its work to meet the growing demand for its specialized transportation service in a large rural community with no public transit.

The purchase of a new accessible wheelchair passenger bus will benefit hundreds of people in Caledon who cannot access community services or even maintain themselves in Caledon without these vehicles. A new vehicle supports CCS' ability to provide safe, comfortable and timely transportation to seniors and those with disabilities. The bus wrap provides easy identification for clients utilizing the service while also promoting the sharing of important contact information throughout the community for all Caledon residents needing any of CCS' services.

CCS' Transportation Program has a fleet of 12 vehicles: 9 wheelchair accessible buses, 1 wheelchair accessible van, 1 passenger van and 1 car. Vehicles range in age from 1-11 years.

CCS has a long history of providing transportation services to Caledon residents. This service began in 1989 as "Med Wheels" and over the years, CCS has invested its own fundraising and various government grants in adapting and expanding its transportation program in response to the growing needs of Caledon residents. CCS continues its work to meet the growing demand for its specialized transportation service in a large rural community with no public transit. The absence of this public service causes extreme hardship for hundreds of Caledon residents who cannot meet their needs through use of a regular automobile.

CCS transportation priorities echo the efforts of Council's workpan. One such priority is the 2018 Town of Caledon Provincial Election Priority that, "The Town of Caledon expects the next Ontario government to include GTA rural communities such as Caledon in its transportation planning".

A CCS partnership is also noted in Goal 6 of the Town of Caledon's Adults 55+ Strategic Plan: "To support additional transportation resources for adults aged 55 and over in the community". Support for the purchase of a new bus is aligned with the Town's 55+ Strategic Plan; it also supports one of the Town's recreation priorities: "To increase participation in community events". CCS' vehicles can be called upon to support Town events such as the Alton Hockey tournament, Youth Dances, etc.

As noted above, the demand for CCS' specialized transportation service continues to grow. CCS provides rides to seniors and people with disabilities that originate across an enormous geographic setting, larger than Mississauga and Brampton combined. Rides are then geo-mapped and traversed throughout the entire Region of Peel and oftentimes into the broader GTA. The expansive size of the service area adds enormous mileage on to our accessible buses in short periods of time. This significantly shortens their years of service before repair costs render them no longer economically viable for the service.

The purchase of a new bus (and the never-ending efforts to replace aging vehicles) allows CCS to sustain a transportation program in Caledon while keeping the cost per ride extremely affordable for seniors and others with disabilities. Safe, reliable and affordable CCS transportation is key for hundreds of Caledon residents to access health care. Specialized transportation removes barriers to participating in civic events and allows people to maintain an active life in their community.

At this time, half of CCS' bus fleet has mileage in excess of 300,000 km. As buses age beyond their five year mark with 350,000+ km travelled, operational costs increase dramatically. Vehicle reliability then becomes a concern and rides are often cancelled. This leaves many Caledon residents without a transportation option and compromises their health and well-being in their home community.



The new starting blocks will be a shared asset with the community and other local sports clubs and schools. We have invited some of these groups to endorse our grant application.

The existing start blocks are decades old and are nearing the end of their service life. Their decks are worn and more seriously there have been weld failures due to corrosion. Furthermore, the design of the current start blocks is not consistent with the current standards used in most training and competition today that incorporate, amongst other things, adjustable front and back start ledges. In other words, the current blocks are not well suited to support competition level training that we have committed to deliver to our athletes.

The useful life of the new blocks should be decades. Moreover, if fiberglass blocks can be accommodated, under assessment, then there are the added benefits of low maintenance and relative ease of installation/removal due to their lightweight construction.

Dependent on which block option is elected the entire grant amount requested may be reduced.

Block Options:

(1) The one firm quote we received, dated November 2017, for drop-in replacement blocks, Xcellerator by Spectrum Aquatics with a steel single-post construction, was \$29,856.81 - taxes included. We were told to expect a 10% increase in 2018.

(2) We also received a preliminary verbal quote of \$35,000 + taxes for the preferred OSB11 fiberglass blocks from Swiss Timing. Compatibility of these blocks is currently under review with vendor and in consultation with the Town Recreation team.

- The Great War Flying Museum is an all-volunteer organization with 60 members. It has been active at Brampton-Caledon Airport for almost 50 years.
- We are dedicated to inspiring a love of early aviation and respect for the men and women who participated in the world's first air war.
- We maintain two buildings, an aircraft hangar and an artefact museum. The hangar is used to build and maintain a fleet of flying World War One reproduction aircraft.
- In 2017, we gave air displays, tours, education and fun to over 4,000 visitors at our home base and over 50,000 at off site air-shows and commemorations.
- Year round, 10 to 15 volunteers work 2 to 4 days a week. Pilots and ground crews augment that number during the summer flying season. On a fine summer evening or for an event, up to 40 volunteers participate.
- Our members include a high level of expertise across all our activities. And they are incredibly hard working. For example 49 volunteers dedicated over 5,000 hours to the artefact museum renovation.
- Our income is self-generated. Sources include air-displays, private funding, membership fees and at-the-door donations.

2. Why the Great War Flying Museum matters

•• Because we attract tourists from outside Caledon:

Our visitor guest book contains names from 21 countries, 7 Canadian provinces and 48 Ontario towns.

- In 2017, we flew at 22 commemorations from Markham to Selfridge, Michigan for schools, veterans and audiences from 100 to 20,000. Air display announcements encourage people to visit us at our home base. Flight-line display banners carry the Town of Caledon logo.
- Many of our visitors come to Caledon specifically for our museum For example, in 2017:
 - We hosted a tour of aviation enthusiasts from England. They visited the National Aviation Museum in Ottawa, Canadian Warplanes Heritage in Hamilton and GWFM in Caledon.
 - We gave tours to groups from Toronto to Acton to Oshawa.
 - A lady on a family visit from England took the time to visit only one museum while she was in Canada. She took a \$50 taxi ride down from Orangeville to GWFM.
 - A visiting General in the German Armed Forces took time from his itinerary to visit GWFM.

•• Because we connect the local community to the airport:

• We attract non-aviation visitors to Brampton-Caledon Airport, which fosters public support for the airport operation and patronage of the airport restaurant.

- We teach the large local population of new Canadians about Canada's proud history.
- We connect long-standing local families. For example a current project in our history team is to identify the members of a newly acquired 1916 pilot's class photo, to research their careers, to connect to their descendants and to bring them together for an event at GWFM.

The Great War Flying Museum is the only organization in Canada that flies full scale WWI aircraft for the public.

- We are the only local school field trip destination that fits the grade 10 curriculum unit on WWI
- We preserve the artefacts, histories and memories of local WWI veterans. Every year we receive the papers and artefacts of Canadian airmen that would otherwise be discarded.

Hospital Purpose:

The hospital will be the first of its kind and will be of great importance to Caledon. It will offer; much needed facilities for the treatment of wildlife, and provide new opportunities for education and awareness to the Caledon community.

By teaching our communities to co-habitate with wildlife and enjoy green spaces while protecting endangered species, the hospital will directly impact the <u>Protection of Rural</u> <u>Environments</u> as outlined in the Town of Caledon Work Plan.

Education (community volunteers):

As a charitable organization, the new hospital will create great opportunities for volunteers of all ages. They can get involved in activities such as cage building and creating nature paths to the various enclosures. 

Subject: Three-Year Summary of CCCGT Finances

In 2017, the changes made to the Caledon Council Community Golf Tournament affected both sides of the ledger. The overall revenue and a detailed breakdown of expenses for 2015, 2016, 2017 are attached as Schedule A. On the revenue side, the goal was to increase both revenue and revenue opportunities in future CCCGT events. With respect to expenses, the changes made help to mitigate risk, increase compliance with policies and procedures and clearly defining the categorization for future events.

The traditional "pyramid style" of sponsorship was forgone with a goal of creating patron-impactful, sponsor-valuable sponsorship levels. Examples of these sponsorships included the scorecard sponsorship, golf cart sponsorship, foursome photo sponsorship and beat the pro sponsorship, which were added to previous assets such as the golf ball sponsorship, long drive sponsorship and closest to the pin sponsorship. Due to changes in the organizational model, a year over year comparison is challenging. Generally speaking, revenue between 2015 - 2017 has remained steady with a variance no greater than +/- 2%. It should be noted that sponsorship revenue achieved per sponsor is the greatest indicator of the new sponsorship structure, achieving an 81% increase in 2017. This number represents an intentional effort to maximize dollars per sponsor.

The subcategories of expenses were changed to more accurately reflect the breakdown of expenses. Expenses are now broken down into the following categories: Catering, Supplies, Rentals, Contracted Services, Advertising and Promotion and Town Staff Assistance, with the removal of the Uniforms and D.J. Services subcategories. Moving forward, these categories will offer greater clarity when referencing expenses related to the event.

As expected, in 2017 there were fluctuations in expenses with specific event changes made to mitigate risk and increase compliance with Town of Caledon corporate policy and procedures. Reviewing the last three events (2015, 2016, 2017), total expenses were \$59,351.18, \$42,934.31 and \$55,430.28 respectively. The most notable differences over the course of the last three events were within the Catering and Contracted Services (categories). Of note, in 2015 green fees amounting to \$15,000 were paid to Osprey Valley Resorts that was not been required in 2016 and 2017.



Catering expenses increased from \$4,451.87 in 2015 to \$7,611.35 in 2016, and then again in 2017 to \$14,171.61. The most significant change in this category in 2017 was the employment of a professional caterer to handle all aspects of food sourcing and preparation, adding to event expenses.

Contracted Services increased in 2017 to \$6,214.80 from \$559.68 in both 2015 and 2016. Aspects of the increase in Contract Services were related the new categorization of expenses (clear definition of Contracted Services), and some are due to changes to the event, primarily with catering and marketing/sponsorship delivery. With the adoption of this new event delivery model, new baselines have been established and fluctuations in revenues and expense should be minimal.
